Public Trust as Infrastructure: CCFI Paper Accepted at CAREE 2025



The 1st Canadian Agri-food & Rural Advisory, Extension, and Education (CAREE) Conference brings together leading scholars, practitioners, policymakers, and community leaders to explore the critical issues facing the future of Canadian agriculture, rural communities, and extension services. Hosted at the University of Guelph, this inaugural event seeks to create a platform for collaborative exchange on the transformative role of agri-food and rural advisory, extension, and education services.

We are honoured that **Ashley Bruner** will be presenting on October 29th, following the acceptance of CCFI's first academic paper submission. The paper introduces a new way of thinking about public trust, not as a communications exercise or messaging outcome, but as infrastructure that underpins the food system itself. Public trust forms the basis for maintaining the social license to operate, enabling resilience and long-term sustainability across Canada's food value chain.

This is distinct from our annual Public Trust Research. While elements of that work have informed the foundation of this paper, the CAREE presentation is intended for an academic and policy-focused audience. It emphasizes theory-building, sector-wide implications, and positions public trust as a critical pillar in the ongoing conversation about Canada's food system.

Algorithms, Al and the Future of Trust in Food and Farming - Webinar Recording Now Available

Artificial intelligence and algorithms are transforming how information is shared, trusted, and acted upon in our food system. On September 25, CCFI hosted a timely webinar with **Dr. Rozita Dara**, Associate Professor at the University of Guelph and co-Director of Al4Food, to explore how these technologies are reshaping credibility and authority in food and farming.

Dr. Dara walked participants through:

- How algorithms influence what we see, who we hear from, and how credibility is built online
- The growing role of generative AI compared to everyday algorithms
- Lessons learned from public health crises like COVID-19 and avian influenza
- The implications for Canadian food and agriculture, from risk communication to building public trust
- Practical takeaways for leaders navigating this rapidly evolving landscape
